1) The South Huron Hospital is now part of an alliance called the Huron Health System, which includes Alexandra Marine and General Hospital in Goderich. How has this new partnership strengthened South Huron Hospital? The partnership between both hospitals has strengthened SHH by providing access to resources with specialized expertise, like surgery, ICU, dialysis, mental



health and obstetrics. The collaboration between both hospitals has provided economies of scale with an integrated leadership team, enhanced access to referrals for CT scans and overall broader service offerings.

2) What are your top priorities for South Huron Hospital right now? The pandemic has produced many challenges for the hospital sector and there are three top priorities as I see it for SHH. First is workforce well-being. I want to ensure that staff and physicians are supported, both physically and mentally. This involves providing necessary resources, addressing burnout, and offering mental health support. If I focus on this, it will help with recruitment and retention of staff. Second is Patient Safety and Quality of Care. With a busy fall/winter season and a trifecta of viruses, the safety and well-being of patients is always paramount. This includes infection control, medication safety, and adherence to best clinical practices. Last is financial stability. Managing resources effectively and ensuring financial stability is crucial for the continued provision of high-quality care. I continue to work with Ontario Health to secure much needed funding that has allowed our doors to remain open so that we can provide care to the community.

3) We've seen lots of temporary ED closures over the past year. Is South Huron Hospital at risk of this? Should we be concerned about the viability of our Hospital and ED? The year 2023 brought with it a renewed sense of purpose and determination within the healthcare community. Our hospital became a beacon of resilience, with healthcare workers and physicians showing extraordinary courage and compassion in the face of a global health crisis. Their tireless efforts ensured that every patient received the care they deserved, regardless of the obstacles before them. Recruitment and retention of all staff is paramount as we face the challenges of health human resources and the dedication of all staff and physicians have been instrumental in keeping our hospital and ED open. We have demonstrated the importance of SHH and cemented our role in the health system and will be here as the provider of health care for the South Huron region.

#### IF YOU BUILD IT...

The South Huron Medical Centre houses a dedicated family practice led by esteemed physicians: Dr. Mario Bueno, Dr. Michaela Ondrejicka, Dr. Neeraj Patel, and Dr. Sean Ryan. Serving a substantial number of patients from South Huron and surrounding area, these physicians play a crucial role not only in providing primary care but also in supporting the South Huron Hospital's Emergency and Inpatient Departments. In the face of mounting challenges within our local healthcare system, our physicians have grappled with rising patient volumes, necessitating a reduction in local walk-in clinic hours- which ensures the physicians are available to serve the South Huron Hospital Emergency Department.



Amidst a healthcare landscape teetering on the edge, South Huron faces a growing crisis with over a thousand residents left without a primary care physician; and the numbers continue to climb. Anticipating a population surge of over 14% in South Huron over the next two years, the situation is poised to intensify. The South Huron Hospital, a beacon of resilience, stands at the forefront, bracing for a surge in Emergency Department (ED) and Inpatient visits. A 160-bed long-term care facility on the horizon only adds to the impending challenge. Against the backdrop of staffing shortages and the tumult of COVID-19, the hospital's untiring team has managed to keep the ED open 24/7, defying the odds. While neighboring EDs grapple with closures, the physicians and staff at South Huron Hospital heroically shoulder regular overtime shifts, ensuring our community's unimpeded access to crucial urgent care. The stakes are high, the challenges daunting, but South

Huron's healthcare providers remain unwavering in their commitment to our well-being.

Unfortunately, South Huron's healthcare system is at a tipping point, with an unsustainable model failing to keep pace with the escalating demand. Physician recruitment has become a paramount priority, not only to address the increased need, but also to plan for an impeding wave of physician retirements. What isn't growing

What isn't growing in proportion to the demand for healthcare is the ability to serve the increased demand.

in proportion to the demand for healthcare is the ability to serve the increased demand. Compounding the urgency, essential healthcare services are dwindling, evidenced by reduced walk-in clinic hours, scaled-back lab and physio services, and other essential outpatient medical services. This crisis demands a dual-focused solution: urgently addressing staffing shortages in the hospital Emergency Department while concurrently bolstering family physician numbers and vital services in the medical centre. The recent reduction in walk-in clinic hours. underscores the need for swift action to prevent the ED from becoming a makeshift substitute for primary care, safeguarding the community's health in the face of these mounting challenges.

To confront these challenges, in collaboration with hospital leadership, the South Huron Medical Centre physicians rolled up their sleeves and began recruiting physicians who would join the family practice and work in the SHH Emergency Department. They successfully recruited Dr. Steven Joseph, formerly Director of Primary Care Sport and Exercise Medicine at



Part of the challenge with respect to the recruitment of physicians is that our current medical centre is not equipped to accommodate

more physicians or patients. We don't have the space or proper resources. So whether we expand our existing space, or invest in a new space, supporting the future of primary care is going to be very important to the residents of South Huron."

the Fowler Kennedy Sport Medicine Clinic. However, recruitment efforts revealed a crucial challenge at our clinic-limited space. The existing physicians are already required to operate on alternate days due to a shortage of exam rooms and office space in the clinic. Bringing on Dr. Joseph required a quick (and temporary) transformation of clinic space into exam rooms for the new physician to practice from. The community now faces pivotal decisions to secure not just immediate solutions but sustainable healthcare infrastructure that will serve the local healthcare system over the next 30+ years.

Looking at ways to "future-proof" the South Huron Medical Centre has brought to light the challenges of its distinctive operating model that sets it apart from other medical facilities in Ontario. Owned and operated by the South Huron Hospital, this unconventional arrangement, conceived decades ago to attract physicians, now faces a critical juncture. Originally intended as a temporary solution, the model has become a permanent fixture, with the hospital annually funding \$500,000 in operating costs. Hospital budgets are not intended to fund medical clinics and primary care, and with South Huron Hospital's budget currently facing a deficit of over \$1 million, the need to

find another solution for the operation of the medical clinic is critical. This prompts a crucial question: Who bears responsibility for steering the clinic's future? This quandary holds profound implications for the community's access to vital healthcare services, underscoring the urgency of resolving the matter.

In recent developments, South Huron Hospital (SHH) CEO Jimmy Trieu approached the South Huron Council, seeking assistance in forming a community committee to address the future of the family practice and medical centre. Backed by the South Huron Hospital Foundation and the physician team, this initiative aims to explore pragmatic solutions, with the ultimate goal of constructing a new clinic. The objective is to ensure sustained access to primary care and a range of primary healthcare services for South Huron residents, while also creating an environment that attracts and retains medical professionals who will also serve the hospital. As of this publication, South Huron Municipal Council has tasked municipal staff with preparing a report to guide

their decision-making. Additionally, Mayor George Finch and South Huron Municipality Chief Administrative Officer Rebekah Msuya-Collison have sought support from Parliamentary Assistant to the Minister of Health, Dawn Gallagher Murphy, emphasizing the importance of the recent South Huron Medical Centre application for FHT funding. Their assistance is acknowledged as the community endeavors to secure its healthcare future.

The South Huron Hospital Foundation is enthusiastic about investing in initiatives that not only bolster the community's health landscape but also ensure the sustained vitality of our hospital. Anticipating innovative solutions from ongoing pivotal discussions, the Foundation expresses optimism about the forthcoming outcomes. The pivotal conversations currently underway hold the key to shaping the future of care in South Huron, relying on a forward-thinking strategy designed to benefit every member of this community. Heartfelt gratitude is extended to our dedicated physicians and medical professionals, who stand steadfast as partners in progress. We are committed to providing them with the space and resources they need in order to provide the best care possible to their patients, and this community.

# **INVESTMENTS WE'RE MAKING IN** 2023/2024



#### LAB CHEMISTRY ANALYZER | \$241,000

Used for analyzing lab draws and diagnosing the various conditions of patients being treated in the Emergency Department and Inpatient Units.

#### PATIENT ENTERTAINMENT | \$110,000

After years of having no televisions or communication devices in our patient wards, we are thrilled to be installing a state-of-the-art patient enteratinment and communication system. The units will allow patients to watch tv, Netflix, browse the web, and even receive educational videos about their treatment plans. The units even allow for phone calls and video calls with family.





## STAFF DURESS SYSTEM | \$10.500

A hospital-wide system which enables staff to sound an alert when they find themselves in an emergency situation. This ensures that staff who are alone can quickly get help. The system announces the location of the staff, and mobilizes all others to assist.

### **WOW CARTS | \$48,500**

Workstations On Wheels provide medical staff with all the resources they need available at their fingertips while treating patients at the bedside. The carts are equipped with charting technology, and standard tools that are used regularly.





#### BARIATRIC PATIENT BED | \$49,200

A larger sized bed for improved comfort, better mobility, and better safety for both patient and staff.

#### **BONE DENSITY SCANNER | \$89,100**

A Bone Mineral Denisty Scanner is a machine used to diagnose bone loss and osteoporosis. A BMD scan can help to predict the likelihood of future bone fractures and other osteo conditions needing treatment.









# **LEAVING A LEGACY:** The Bell Family

The South Huron Hospital Foundation was the grateful recipient of a very generous bequest from the Estate of Anne Bell. Anne's \$294,000 gift comes with wonderful meaning as Anne's parents, Elmer and Barbara Bell, were major supporters during the hospital's first years. In fact, when the hospital doors opened in 1953, Elmer Bell was the Chairman of the Hospital's board of directors. He was an integral part of the campaign to build a hospital in Exeter.

Anne was born in Toronto, and adopted by her parents Elmer and Barbara. She spent her childhood growing up in Exeter, attending Exeter Public School and South Huron High School. She then continued her education at Elma College, an all girls school. Once graduated, she became a law clerk at her fathers



law office in Exeter. Anne enjoyed singing, and was known for her beautiful voice. She enjoyed riding horses, and spending time at the family cottage. Anne had a love for all animals and took care of her cats and dogs like they were her children. She eventually settled at the Exeter Villa, making many friends whom will fondly remember her.


